



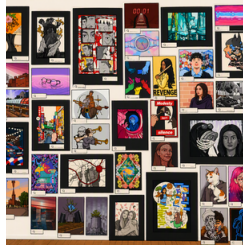

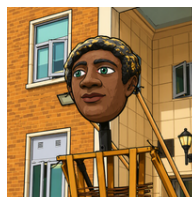
SOLVE
